RE: Executive Summary—2026 Massachusetts Registered Voter Survey

Polity Research Consulting conducted a WEB-based survey among 608 Massachusetts registered voters between April 29th and May 7th, 2026. The sample was constructed to represent the registered voter population of the state. The margin of error on the full, 608-member sample is $\pm 3.97\%$ at the mid-range of the 95% confidence interval. That is, when conducting 100 such surveys, 95 of them will yield results that fall—at worst—3.97 points on either side of a given percentage.

The results from this survey indicate that Massachusetts voters are laser-focused on the “pocketbook” issues they have to face every day. When asked an open-ended question about the ‘most important problems’ facing the state, *eight of the top ten responses* deal with some aspect of the cost of living in Massachusetts—ranging from energy and housing to health care and groceries. When asked if leaders on Beacon Hill have “helped” or “hurt” the effort to make life more affordable in the state, a majority (53%) say those leaders have *hurt* the affordability cause. When presented with information on health care and energy mandates passed by legislators—along with the fact of increased state spending at *twice* the rate that taxpayer income—voters are even *more* likely to think state leaders are culpable on the affordability front.

And, the overall mood of voters in Massachusetts has *continued* to become more pessimistic—sharply worsening over time. Today, barely more than one-third of voters (36%) think things in Massachusetts are “headed in the right direction”—down 3 points from a year ago. More strikingly, just three years ago the “right direction” number stood at 59%—*23 points higher than it is today*. And, 47% of registered voters express a lack of confidence in the current state of the Massachusetts economy—with just 12% saying they are “very confident” about the state’s economy.

The plurality of Massachusetts registered voters (36%) think state government spends “too much”—an increase of 5% since last year. Also, solid majorities continue to favor *reducing* the state sales tax (59%, up from 55% last year) and local property taxes (60%, up from 58% last year). And, while last year, a plurality thought the state’s 5% income tax should stay at the same level—this year, a plurality (44%) support a *cut* in the income tax. It’s not surprising then, that voters—by a 78% to 15% margin—say they would vote to reduce the state income tax from 5%

to 4%. By a 76% to 12% margin, they *also* favor a ballot measure that would adjust the state revenue spending cap to trigger more frequent refunds to taxpayers.

Solid majorities of registered voters also think that it would help them “make ends meet” each month if the state income tax were lowered (52%), state mandates on health insurance were lowered (56%) and state mandates on utilities were lowered (61%). Focusing on the state’s signature health care mandate, an astounding three-quarters of voters “strongly” (41%) or “somewhat” (34%) agree that—considering its impact on health insurance premiums—it should be *repealed*.

When considering the costs faced by small businesses in Massachusetts, most voters continue to cite health insurance costs as the top obstacle. However, the percentage of voters mentioning “energy and utility” costs has jumped from 9% in 2025 to 16% today.

All in all, it’s clear that Massachusetts registered voters are *strongly* concerned with the cost of living in the state—and, moreover, they see state leaders making things worse. What follows are key questions in the survey dealing with affordability issues (along with demographics):

To start off, what do you think are the one or two most important problems facing Massachusetts today—*the ones that affect you and your family the most?*
